**2020 ELECTIONS: SENIORS TRACKER** 

SEPTEMBER: 2020



A majority of senior voters on Medicare (80%) do not think it will be difficult to vote this year amid the COVID-19.

- However, the percentage of Democrat voters who expect difficulty voting increased over the past month increased 4%, while it decreased 7% among Republican voters.
- And, the percent of senior voters planning to vote in person on Election Day increased 7% over the past month.
- While senior voters selecting COVID-19 as one of their top 2 issues decreased 5% over the past month, the percent selecting national security (+4%) and racial inequality (+5%) increased.
- A slight plurality of senior voters on Medicare (36%) want to strengthen the Affordable Care Act (ACA), this percentage decreased rather than repeal and replace the ACA (32%) or move to a single-payer system (12%).
  - However, the percent who selected strengthening the ACA decreased 6%.

A majority of senior voters support placing a cap on what seniors pay out-of-pocket for prescriptions drugs in the Medicare Part D program (84% total support, 57% strongly support).

- Net support for legislation that would evenly distribute out-of-pocket costs over the cost of the year slightly increased among Biden voters (+4) over the past month.
- More than three in four (77%) senior voters on Medicare are currently comfortable going to their doctor to receive routine medical care in person, however this differs among Trump and Biden voters.
  - Net comfort going to the doctor decreased among Trump voters (-7), while it slightly increased among Biden voters (+4).



Forty percent of senior voters on Medicare report they've personally delayed seeking routine medical care since the start of COVID-19.

The percent of senior voters on Medicare who have delayed seeking medical care increased 3% over the past month.

#### Methodology:

Wave 1: This poll was conducted between August 7-10, 2020 among a national sample of 1000 senior voters on Medicare.

Wave 2: This poll was conducted September 3-6, 2020 among a national sample of 1,000 senior voters on Medicare. The interviews were conducted online, and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of senior voters on Medicare based on gender and race. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.



Biden voters on Medicare are more likely than Trump voters on Medicare to anticipate difficulty voting because of COVID-19 (22% vs. 10%).



The percentage of Democrat Medicare voters who expect difficulty voting increased 4% over the past month, while it decreased 7% among Republican voters on Medicare.


How much difficulty, if any, do you believe you will have in voting in this year's presidential election because of COVID-19 or the coronavirus?

Reported voting methods differ greatly by party identification: 57% of Republican seniors report their intent to vote in-person compared to 31% of Democrat seniors who say the same.







The percent of senior voters ranking COVID-19 as a *very important* issue when they cast their vote decreased 5% over the past month.





While senior voters selecting COVID-19 as one of their top issues decreased 5% over the past month, the percent selecting national security (+4%) and racial inequality (+5%) increased.




The percent of Democrat senior voters selecting racial inequality as a top 2 issue increased 9% over the past month.







Out-of-pocket costs and affordability of health insurance are *very important* to senior voters on Medicare (63% *very important*).









This issue divides along partisan lines for senior voters: a majority of Democrats (61%) want to strengthen the ACA, while a majority of Republicans (60%) want to repeal and replace the ACA.



The percent of senior voters on Medicare who selected repealing and replacing the ACA increased 6% over the past month, while the percent who selected strengthening the ACA decreased 6%.



Eighty four percent of senior voters on Medicare support placing a cap on what seniors pay out-ofpocket for prescription drugs in the Medicare Part D program.



















A candidate's plan to address out-of-pocket costs for prescription medications is important to senior voters across the political spectrum, although intensity of importance is higher among Democrat voters.





A candidate supporting a cap on what seniors pay out-of-pocket for prescription drugs in the Medicare Part D program is not very risky: 59% of senior voters are more likely to support that candidate while just 2% are less likely to support a candidate for that stance.
















