Despite 2020 healthcare worries and concerns, seniors on Medicare are clear on their health policy priorities for the coming year.



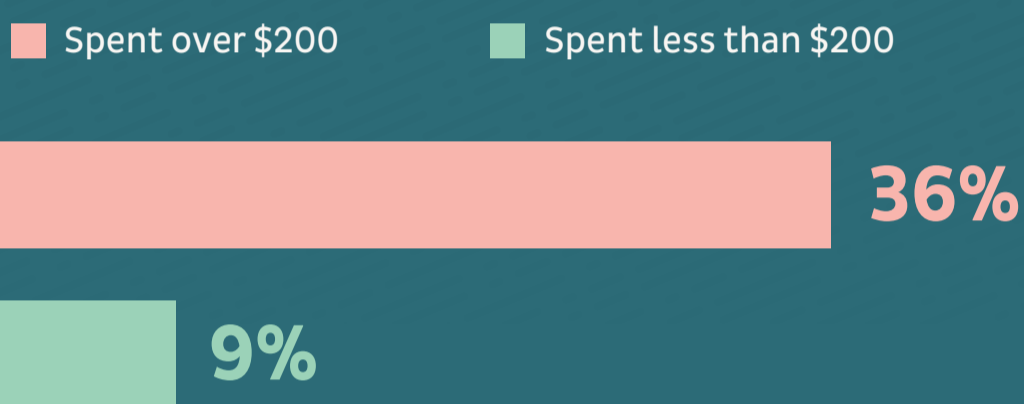
Seniors on Medicare faced high out-of-pocket costs on deductibles, co-pays, and coinsurance for their prescription drugs in 2020

Thinking about 2020, how much did you spend out-of-pocket on deductibles, co-pays and coinsurance for your prescription drugs?



Paying out-of-pocket for prescription drugs in 2020 was particularly worrisome for seniors on Medicare with high out-of-pocket costs

Seniors worrying about the price they paid at the pharmacy counter or by mail order for their prescription drugs in 2020



34% of seniors on Medicare with high out-of-pocket costs reduced other spending in order to afford their prescription drugs

COVID-19 impacted the health and financial decisions of many seniors on Medicare

A majority of seniors on Medicare say COVID-19 impacted their healthcare decisions in the following ways:

Priorities for first 100 days

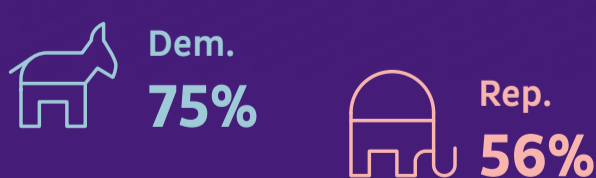
A bipartisan majority of seniors on Medicare agree **lowering out-of-pocket costs** should be a priority for the Biden-Harris administration in its first 100 days.

METHODOLOGY:

This poll was conducted between January 5-9, 2021 among a national sample of 1,000 seniors taking prescription drugs on Medicare with prescription drug coverage and a chronic condition (referred throughout as seniors on Medicare). The interviews were conducted online and the data were unweighted. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.
